FAPSC-PAC FUND RAISING EFFORT

1. FAPSC-PAC activated and approved by Florida Division of Elections
2. Dues structure established (see page 3 of this document)
3. Conference calls held/scheduled with FAPSC-PAC Board, CEOs and Lobby Team
4. Eagle membership solicitations are first priority
5. Membership at all levels will be marketed to entire organization through e-mail and print materials
6. Fund raising goal by July 1: \$139,000
 - \$50,000 for House Campaigns
 - \$39,000 for Senate Campaigns (\$11,000 delivered in December 2007)
 - \$ 5,000 each for 10 individual battleground races
7. Evening Reception at Annual Conference to deliver leadership and individual gifts:

FAPSC-PAC RULES

1. Are corporate donations, including publicly-traded corporations, allowable under state and federal regulations?

Under Florida law, the CCE can accept corporate as well as individual contributions (in CCE parlance, membership dues). It makes no difference under Florida law if the shares of the corporation are publicly traded. However, under federal tax laws, 501(c)(3) organizations cannot contribute to the CCE, although the officers and directors of such organizations may in their individual capacities.

2. If individual checks are given to candidates, may the checks come from corporations, including publicly-traded, or must they be from individuals?

Under Florida law, corporations may make contributions to candidates. Each corporate entity (parent, subsidiary, sibling) is treated as a separate person for the purpose of making a contribution. In addition, individuals who are officers and directors of a corporation are separate persons for the purpose of making a contribution.

3. Relationship of CCE to federal candidates and committees.

The CCE cannot make contributions to federal candidates or federal committees. It is not a committee registered with the Federal Elections Commission (FEC). In order to make contributions to federal candidates or federal committees, a separate committee must be established with the FEC that can accept only contributions from individuals.
